

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD)

Every year, all schools in Australia participate in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD). The NCCD process requires schools to identify information already available in the school about supports provided to students with disability. These relate to legislative requirements under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992* and the Disability Standards for Education 2005, in line with the *NCCD guidelines* (2019).

Attached to this newsletter is fact sheet for parents, carers and guardians to provide more information pertaining to the NCCD and answer questions regarding this process.





Classroom Heartbeat

Prep _____

In Prep, we've been learning all about living and non-living things in our science lessons. We've been comparing the needs of animals and plants. We discovered that while they have some differences, there are also things they both need to survive!

To help organise our thinking, we created a Venn diagram to show what is unique to animals or plants, and what they have in common. The students included drawings and symbols in their diagrams to represent different needs, making their learning visual and meaningful. They've loved making connections and sharing their discoveries!





Focus From the Heart

Building strong movers at Immaculate Heart of Mary

Each Friday, our Prep to Grade 2 students take part in a fun and active Gross Motor program run by Mr Clark and Ms Jordana Drew (our AFL Sportsready student). Over 30 energetic minutes, students rotate through eight different stations, each one designed to help build their Fundamental Movement Skills (FMS) – the building blocks for confident movers!

The activities focus on key skills like kicking, catching, throwing, bouncing, running and dodging. Whether they're weaving through cones, bouncing balls, or perfecting their aim, students are developing coordination, balance and control – all while having a blast to music!

This program is more than just movement – it also helps children learn how to take turns, follow rules, and support each other. It's a fantastic way to build confidence and set students up for future success in team games and active play.

Our program supports the goals of the Australian Curriculum for Health and Physical Education by helping students:

- o Practise and explore movement skills
- Learn how to move safely and confidently
- Understand fair play and cooperation

WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the Disability Discrimination Act 1992.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable.
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (le Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.
